The Secret Path

Description: Gord Downie's The Secret Path and a post—show CBC Arts live panel on the road to reconciliation.

On October 22, 1966, near Kenora, Ontario, Chanie Wenjack died when he was walking home to the family he was taken from over 400 miles away. Fifty years later, Tragically Hip frontman Gord Downie took Wenjack's story and turned it into the Secret Path project, including a solo album, a graphic novel, and an animated film.

Indian Horse

Description: Based on the Award Winning Bestseller by Richard Wagamese, this film sheds list on the dark history of Canada's boarding schools or Indian Residential Schools and the indomitable spirit of Aboriginal peoples.

In late 1950's Ontario, eight year old Saul Indian Horse is torn from his Ojibway family and committed to one of the notorious Catholic Residential Schools. In this oppressive environment, Saul is denied the freedom to speak his language or embrace his Indigenous heritage while he witnesses horrendous abuse at the hands of the very people entrusted with his care. Despite this, Saul finds salvation in the unlikeliest of places and favourite winter pastime – hockey. Fascinated by the game, he secretly teaches himself to play, developing a unique and rare skill. He seems to see the game in a way no other player can.

His talent leads him away from the misery of the school, eventually leading him to the pros. But the ghosts of Saul's past are always present, and threaten to derail his promising career and future. Forced to confront his painful past, Saul draws on the spirit of his ancestors and the understanding of his friends to begin the process of healing.

nîpawistamâsowin: We Will Stand Up, directed by Tasha Hubbard

Description: "On August 9, 2016, a young Cree man named Colten Boushie died from a gunshot to the back of his head after entering Gerald Stanley's rural property with his friends. The jury's subsequent acquittal of Stanley captured international attention, raising questions about racism embedded within Canada's legal system and propelling Colten's family to national and international stages in their pursuit of justice. Sensitively directed by Tasha Hubbard, *nîpawistamâsowin: We Will Stand Up* weaves a profound narrative encompassing the filmmaker's own adoption, the stark history of colonialism on the Prairies, and a vision of a future where Indigenous children can live safely on their homelands."
